Consultation begins on Neighbourhood Plan

Villagers' top priority is that the Neighbourhood Plan protects the rural environment, byways, woodland, footpaths, views and vistas, according to feedback from the Neighbourhood Plan Workshops held in September.

Taken from an analysis of the views expressed by over 100 workshop attendees at three sessions held in the village hall, residents would want to see reflected in the Neighbourhood Plan small scale housing development which would prioritise housing for the elderly, and affordable housing for young people/families. In terms of design of such housing, residents in the main, would like to see the principles of the *Village Design Statement* upheld – recognising too that innovation in design could also be a feature of the Plan.

Residents called for more rentable properties to be made available and for the protection of ancient sites and conservation areas within the village.

In supporting the local economy villagers would like to see small scale business developments and would like to have more influence around agricultural development.

Residents were asked to express their "hopes" and "fears" around a number of topics that are linked to potential land use in the Parish: Housing Development, Economic Development, Design Development and Community Development.

Their comments were then analysed by the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group and grouped into sentiments—that could then provide guidelines for the development of the Plan. The main sentiments expressed by those present at the workshops are detailed in the box opposite.

In terms of land-use for community facilities there was strong sentiment around consideration for more sports facilities such as an all-weather surface for tennis etc plus more outdoor fitness equipment. There were also sentiments expressed around improvements to the Games Barn, more facilities for children and young people and for public spaces in the For-

was a

strong desire to protect the rural environment and village feel and to ensure that any development went through robust planning processes with fact based future housing requirements. There was a requirement to see trust in the planning process and decision-making. There was also sentiment expressed around the Plan providing a way for older people who want to stay in the village to be able to down-size and free up more family housing, through the provision of housing for older people. There were concerns expressed that too much housing could lead to a loss of identity for individual villages.

Villagers' concerns passed to Parish Council

The focus of a Neighbourhood Plan is around land use in the village. However the workshops provided an opportunity for other issues to be raised. Many of these lie outside the remit of a Neighbourhood Plan, but the Steering Group have collated the issues raised and passed these to the Parish Council:

The most common issues were around:

Protecting local amenities such as the shop and Post Office, the Pubs and the garage

Protecting surrounding woodland, public footpaths and seats Improving the broadband and mobile phone signal across the whole village

More bus services

Stopping speeding through the village

No more street lighting wanted

Crime prevention

Better Parking

Improve facilities such as the Games Barn, Children's Playground Prevent dog-fouling

Looking at planning on existing houses

More council houses

Using the Church building for more activities

Outdoor gym equipment—children's and adults

Better access to health provision

Having received a clear remit from villagers who attended the September workshops (see pages 1 and 3), the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group will meet in November to start to pull together more concrete proposals for the Plan which will then be communicated to residents in the New Year.

One of the key objectives of the Plan is that "Everybody who lives, works and plays in Egerton Parish has a say in what goes into our Neighbourhood Plan". This was reinforced by comments received during these first workshops, particularly concerning the requirement to involve younger participants in the process. The Steering Group has pulled together a sub-group - the Neighbourhood Plan Community Engagement Strategy Team - which has produced a draft communications plan which will go before the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group for their input in November. This will include plans for communication with residents via electronic and social media, which are often the favoured communications channels of the more 'digitally savvy' members of our community. The Steering group is particularly keen to hear the views of younger residents of the village – and is hoping that this will provide an additional channel through which villagers can communicate their thoughts and ideas.

The Steering Group and sub-groups that are working on the Plan are made up entirely of volunteers, who are giving up their time and resources to help make this Plan work for the village. It is an extremely large and complex task. In 2011 the company started its Customer Metering Programme. It has been working through its supply area on a street-by-street basis since then and is due to reach the Ashford area this autumn. The aim is to have 90 per cent of households on metered charges by the end of the scheme, scheduled for 2020.

The compulsory programme was introduced after the south east of England was classed as an area of serious water stress by the Environment Agency. This is because climate change warmer, drier weather - alongside projected population

growth, is expected to put further pressure on the water avail-

South East Water has a long-term investment programme to tackle this issue. The Customer Metering Programme is an essential part of it, because research shows households with a water meter use 15 per cent less water than those without.

Every new house built since 1989 has a meter fitted and many customers have already opted to switch to a water meter to pay only for the water they use. By installing water meters for the remaining customers, South East Water can meet the challenge of providing enough water for our future needs. It also means it can delay introducing more expensive solutions to provide the necessary water and keep bills lower.





Remembering Mary Adams-Beck

27th April 1922 - 12th September 2017

Mary's dear friend, Imogen Taylor, writes:

Mary was my neighbour and my parents neighbour for thirty five years, and she was a perfect neighbour and became a dear friend. Our lives were very different, mine as a single career woman, and as an only child, hers as one of a family of seven children, twice married and with two sons and many grandchildren and great grandchildren. But we shared our love of the countryside and of Egerton in particular.

Her life had been hard after a very happy childhood, as her first husband, Patrick Coates,

died only five years after they married, leaving her with a son David who was four and a baby, Simon who was six months old. She had trained as a nurse and took various jobs as live-in matron at schools in Forest Row and Seaford.

Many years later, in 1968, she married John Adams-Beck and they moved to Southfield on the border of Egerton. Their marriage lasted for ten years until his death and that led to her moving to Jonstone West and becoming our neighbour. Mary continued working as a JP until she was seventy, and did various volunteer work, such as a 'cruse' councillor, a governor of Egerton school, work at the Heart of Kent hospice and secretary of the Friends of St. James's to mention a few.

I knew her as a smiling, warm hearted and practical friend, discussing with her, over endless teas, village life and her family, whom I had got

to know over the years. We walked our dogs together and exchanged plants and on one happy occasion she came to Burgundy with her family, to share my 80th birthday celebrations. She was the belle of the ball on that weekend and I miss her very much.

Mrs Ruth Russell died on 19th October 2017. A funeral service in celebration of her life was held on November 7th at St James' Church.



'Many hands make light work'



Gale King reports:

The Kent God's Acre Project recognises churchyards as significant areas for flora, fauna and social history, and St James', Egerton has taken part in this ongoing project since 2010. There is more information about the importance of churchyards for wildlife on a board inside the church porch.

As part of the project, on 19th August, an enthusiastic band of workers met in Egerton churchyard armed with strimmers, rakes and secateurs in preparation for the annual cut-down and rake-up of the area of grass at the far end of the churchyard. This remains unmown during the summer months to provide habitat for wildlife: small mammals, reptiles, birds and insects, as well as wild flowers, including yellow rattle, oxeye daisy and knapweed. As autumn approaches, however, the grass needs to be cut and the cuttings removed to encourage more wildflowers in the following year. Coarser plants such as hogweed, which suppress the more delicate species, are tackled throughout the summer and prevented from going to seed. This year, the 'adopted' grave plot under the ash tree also produced an abundance of self-seeded oxeye daisies, which was a nice surprise. Sarah Widd made sure that our strength was kept up during the morning with good, strong coffee and a choice of home-made cake. Peter Wilcock had strimmed the area the week before, which enabled flower seed to fall before we removed the 'hay', and also made things easier for us, giving more time to undertake extra work

such as chopping brambles and overhanging branches, clearing the perimeter path and access to the bug hotel, and pulling out yet more hogweed from under the hedges. All in all, it was a very satisfying morning's work. Many thanks to all who rose to the challenge! Unfortunately, for several

reasons, this year Sarah and Gale were unable to organise the activities in the churchyard usually enjoyed by the local schoolchildren during Cherishing Churchyards Week in June.

This was due in part to building work going on inside the church at the time and a section of the churchyard being 'out of bounds' as a result. They are, however, planning some exciting things to entertain and inform the children about the importance of the churchvard for wildlife and social were also suspended during the building work but, following liaison with the school, have already started to reappear. 



Due to a strong wind the flames spread to the houses on the bridge and many people were trapped in the middle and were incinerated and three thousand bodies were recovered from the water.

September meeting consisted of a talk on 'The Tree of Hope' families-tales of courage and determination. The Tree of Hope children's charity was founded in 1992 and was born out of a desire to help children raise funds for treatments and services not easily available from UK Health services. It's 25th anniversary will be celebrated

in October this year. Gill Gibbsour speaker-gave us a few examples of children they have helped. Some have no limbs at all or are unable to talk, walk, etc but with appropriate help they have become mobile, and many have achieved exam wonderful results An extra collection was made for this charity.

Proposed Parliamentary Boundary Changes

Richard King, chairman of Egerton Parish Council writes about an issue that <u>could</u> put Egerton into a new Parliamentary constituency!

On 17th October the Boundary Commission published new proposals to change the parliamentary constituency boundaries in England. Egerton is affected, as it would take us out of the Ashford constituency and place our parish in a new constituency named Mid Kent and Ticehurst. Further details can be found on their website - https://www.bce2018.org.uk/node/6488? postcode=TN279BP

Last year the Parish Council strongly objected to a similar suggestion, but these new proposals are almost the same in that all of the parliamentary constituency of Ashford to the west of Great Chart would move into a new parliamentary constituency called Mid Kent and Ticehurst. Local government boundaries are not affected, and we would still be a part of the Borough of Ashford, but if these proposals go ahead the Member of Parliament representing Egerton's interests at Westminster would cease to be Ashford's MP



and instead would be one covering a vast area with which we have little in common, extending miles westwards into East Sussex, and

would have nothing whatsoever to do with Ashford. The Parish Council believes that this is wrong.

An MP representing Egerton and our adjoining parishes must be able to identify with our needs and interests in the context of Ashford, and because our ties with Ashford are very strong, Egerton (and also Charing Heath, Pluckley, Smarden and Bethersden) should be represented in Parliament by the MP for Ashford.

The Parish Council objects to these new proposals, and is suggesting to the Boundary Commission a way in which these new parliamentary boundaries can be changed to allow Egerton and our neighbouring villages to remain a part of the

Ashford constituency. Anyone can make representations to the Boundary Commission about this, either through their website, or by writing to them at 35 Great Smith Street, London SW1P 3BO. If you feel strongly about this issue, the Parish Council would urge you to make your views known. The closing date for comment is 11th Decem-







Preheat the oven to 160C/325F/Gas 3. Crush the salt, pepper and juniper berries (grated ginger) together.

Heat the olive oil in a large casserole and brown the floured pork (or vegan alternative) in batches. Remove so you can then fry off the other ingredients.

Fry the onions in the same casserole until softened and translucent. Return the meat/veggie ingredient. Ladle the stock over the casserole and stir well. Include the salt, pepper etc at this point.

Take the sliced discs of apple and turnip and/or local potatoes, and layer them over the casserole, alternating between the two. Scatter little knobs of the butter over the top. Place the lid over the casserole and bake for two hours, removing the lid or foil, for the last 30 minutes.

Celebrating Ashford's famous residents

The fourth in the series of the Leader of the Ashford Borough Council's Series of Briefings is that it is 50 years since the death of Sir Malcolm Sargent

During the 2017 BBC Proms season in July, members may have seen Prom 13, an exact recreation of Sir Malcolm Sargent's 500th (and sadly, last) Prom. This was to mark 50 years since the death of the revered conductor, organist and champion of English composers, who was born in Ashford.

Harold Malcolm Sargent was born in 1895 in Ashford whilst his mother was visiting relatives in the borough - at Bath Villas, now 34 Beaver Road. Malcolm Sargent Road in Kingsnorth - which leads into Norman ward, where Beaver Road is situated - is named in honour of him.

A distinguished musical education saw Sargent gain a scholarship to Stamford School in Lincolnshire where he studied the piano, organ and singing in choirs and studied musicology at Durham University.


His studies were interrupted in 1916, when he was enlisted for military service. In

May 1918, posted with the Durham Light Infantry to Herne Bay, he returned to Kent. He never saw service abroad, was demobilised in January 1919 and resumed his studies at Durham University.

In 1921 another great British conductor, Sir Henry Wood, asked him to conduct one of his compositions at a concert in Leicester. So impressed was Sir Henry, that he invited him to perform the same piece at a Promenade Concert (the original Proms) in the summer of 1921. Sir Malcolm then concentrated on a career in conducting thereafter.

He went on to conduct for a number of notable choirs and orchestras, becoming chief conductor for the Royal Choral Society in 1928 and setting up the London Philharmonic Orchestra in the 1930s. Sargent's impeccable style, brisk conducting speed and ability to race from one recording session to another with almost no break in between led others to refer to him as 'Flash Harry'. He was knighted for his contribution to British music in 1947.

Sadly his health began to deteriorate in the mid-1960s, dying of pancreatic cancer on the 8th October 1967 at the age of 72, but not before attending his final Last Night of the Proms, an event that had become synonymous with Sir Malcolm Sargent. He handed over the baton to Colin Davis.

The Garden in Winter

Tips for the amateur gardener from the Dobbie's website



November

Flowers

- Prune back roses and tidy up shrubs
- Plant later flowering spring bulbs such as lilies and tulips
- Dig up and divide established plants which are now overcrowded and replant pansies, primulas and other winter/spring bedding plants

Fruit

- Harvest and store late apples and pears and prune these trees
- Plant new fruit trees once the ground has been dug and manured
- Apply a "winter wash" against pests
- Raspberry canes are available for planting now

Vegetables

- Dig over vacant ground and work in well rotted manure or compost
- Order seed catalogues
- Protect cauliflower curds by bending a few leaves over the centre
- If storing vegetables make sure that they are well spaced and dry, and if any are rotting throw them away
- Leeks and parsnips may be left in the ground until required for use

Lawns

- There is still time to apply an autumn lawn food and mosskiller
- Spike badly drained lawns to improve drainage and scarify to remove dead grass
- It may still be necessary to give the lawn a final cut on a high blade set-
- If not too wet or cold, turfing can still be carried out.

December

With the approach of winter the garden takes on an air of quietness. There is an absence of urgency and a more leisurely pace can be taken leading up to a well deserved Christmas break. After the festivities thoughts can turn to the garden.

Flowers

- If not frosty plant new rose
- Cut back the herbaceous border and mulch thickly with composted bark
- Protect delicate evergreens from cold winds by using horticultural fleece

Fruit

Still time to plant new fruit bushes if the soil is not frozen

Vegetables

- Buy seeds now to ensure full availability
- Net winter vegetables to keep pigeons away

Lawns

- Avoid walking on lawns in frosty weather
- If puddles stay on the lawn spike with a garden fork or an aerator to aid drainage and prevent disease
- Consider having lawn mowers and strimmers serviced

Greenhouse

Clear greenhouse gutters of autumn leaves.

January

January brings us the shortest and coldest days of the year. It is an ideal time to catch up on reading gardening advice Top 10 tips to get ahead this January:

- Christmas tree plant as soon as possible in January. Select well drained soil, sun and enough space for your tree to sit comfortably. Keep it watered and protected
- Buy seeds early
- Look out for plug plants small bedding plants are available early in the year. Pot up and grow before planting outside after risk of frost
- Decide on a colour theme colour them your containers and accessories. Keep your eyes peeled for things that fit in with your colour scheme
- Clean and service tools get your tools up to scratch
- Move plants it's best to move plants when they're fairly dormant
- Design new borders get creative and plan new borders. Use the traditional method, and take pencil to paper to work out perfect plant combinations for the New Year
- Tidy your borders cut back and clear dead foliage and the last of any fallen leaves.

Flying the Red Ensign in Egerton



Sarah Widd celebrated Merchant Navy Day, 3rd Sept 2017 Such was the wish

the Earl of Wessex and Admiral Lord West,

and in Egerton, that's just what we did.

Our ceremony was held on the Glebe, a lovely service led by Rev Jack Bateson with readings by Claire Foinette and Cpt Peter



Widd and attended by several villagers, including relatives of Merchant Navy seamen and officers, most notably Rob Walker, who very kindly paid for Egerton's Red Ensign, as his father was a Chief Engineer in the Merchant Navy The flag was flown proudly from St James' tower flagpole.

You may well wonder why we are celebrating in 2017, and why the 3rd Sept? Yes, the first day of the Second World War in 1939, but the first ship to be torpedoed and sunk was the SS Athenia, a merchantman, which went down within hours of the outbreak of hostilities with the loss of 128 souls, crew and passengers!

And why 2017? Well, the reason is that 2017 is the centenary of Seafarers UK (formerly King George's Fund for Sailors) which administers the Merchant Navy Fund to provide help and support for Merchant Seafarers and their families in times of need.

Since 1864, the Red Ensign has been the exclusive flag of the British Merchant Navy,

the incredibly important, arm of the defence and welfare of Britain in both World Wars. and, in peacetime, providing our sceptred isle with fuel and goods from all round the world, and command of both braving storms, hazardous working conditions, piracy and long periods away from family and friends.

> The Red Ensign (Red Duster) has an interesting history- being used by the English Navy in 1620 as a red flag with St George's Cross in one guarter, and, with the union of Scotland and Ireland with England, the flag also changed to become the Union Jack in the quarter. For clarity in 1864 it was decreed that the Red Ensign would be exclusive to our Merchant Marine, the White Ensign for the Royal Navy and the Blue Ensign for the Royal Navy Reserve Fleet.

> Admiral Lord West, a salty sailor himself, together with the Earl of Wessex, as Patron of Seafarers UK, both wanted to promote the nationwide celebration of Merchant Navy Day! And so, in this historic year, and on this historic date, Merchant Navy Day was celebrated by Egerton, and we will be proud to continue Flying the Flag for those in peril on the seas on Sept 3rd every year, in remem-

brance and celebration of our wonderful Merchant Navy!

Your Parish Council Reports

August Minutes

PCSO: On Wednesday 12th July the Chairman, Vice-Chairman and the Clerk had a meeting with PCSO Angie Burden who mentioned that she and PCSO Paul Moorey would be moving on in September. The Clerk contact Sgt Jasmine Bloomfield and invite her to the October PC meeting when she could let EPC know who would be taking over. Sgt Bloomfield declined the invitation and would not commit to who might be the next PCSO.

Footpaths and Stiles: Report No. 88 of the Egerton Footpaths Representative

was received. Still 7 issues outstanding. On 3 items the KCC has provided new wooden stiles and the landowner has to erect them. Until that has been done and checked they can't come off the list. Highways: The fallen tree across Egerton House Road has been removed. The issue of 11 of the 15 drains down Stonebridge Green Road being blocked is still outstanding.

Neighbourhood and Parish Plans: A meeting was held on the 11th July and the plan is moving forward. The next meeting will be Tuesday 8th August. Broadband: Many villagers have been having problems with Internet connections.

Residents at Mundy Bois are not happy that they are not part of the upgrade to faster broadband. Changes for residents on prefix 840 numbers to 756 numbers is ongoing.

The Clerk has had to get signed letters from some residents in Harmers Way and Stevens Close. The Clerk will arrange to meet with BT and KCC.

Sale of Barn: The storage area offered by a villager has been taken up by the players to store their equipment. The Chairman now has the offer of a barn for other village equipment. The new owner of Groom Farm barn offered to transport from his barn to the new location. A

Entrance Signs/Village Gateways: A request has been made for a site visit with KCC to discuss options and costs. New Road Bus Stop: KCC have advised the hardstanding bus stop adjacent to the Barrow House could not be extended in length as the road is too narrow. Councillors agreed not to pursue extending it.

Mobile Phone Signal: The Vice-Chairman will write to Damian Green to update him on recent news.

Play area: The Wicksteed inspection is due. A Councillor will accompany the Clerk and the inspector. The Clerk will contact Iulian Mills before the inspection to ask him to finalise all work.

Trees: The Clerk has received a quote to crown a tree in Elm Close and prune the tree next to the basket-ball hoop.

Notice boards: The Clerk is awaiting a quote for repairs to the notice board on the wall of the Queens Arms. The hall committee agree to have the notice board from The Glebe on the wall of the Computer room.

Fly The Red Ensign: The PCC will conduct a service on the Glebe on 3rd September. The Clerk will see if the flag can be hoisted and put up notices. Speeding in Egerton: A Councillor has arranged for the Speedwatch coordinator to attend the next meeting. An article on this subject will be in the next Egerton Update.

Gift of Land: Richard has written to Derek Marks to thank him for his offer and that EPC accept.

The Clerk has written to Hallett & Co to him on recent news. This will be disinform them that the process has started. Derek has moved to a new solicitors and EPC are waiting to hear from both teams.

Hall Garden: The WI are to have the garden refurbished. A border will be placed along the pathway by the Committee room to stop the mud being washed from the garden into the drain gully. When this is in place the drain gully will be cleaned out to stop flooding.

September Minutes

421 Canadian War Memorial Service

The 2017 Commemoration Service— **Bedlam Lane, Egerton**







The 2017 service to commemorate the 127 Canadian Wing and the American 362nd Fighter Groups was held on Sunday 3rd September at 2.30pm.

Whilst the organisers were informed on the Thursday previously that unfortunately we would not be having the flypast due to the fact that all the official spitfires were grounded for the time being, the quick-thinking of Sue Palmer saved the day. She contacted Headcorn Airfield and asked them if anyone was using the private spitfires which operate from there around about 3.00pm it would save the day if they could conveniently fly over the Memorial and make a big crowd very happy - and that is exactly what they did!

The Revd. Sheila Cox conducted the service. She welcomed everyone there to remember the men and women of 127 Canadian Wing and 362 American Fighter Group who were stationed here during the Second World War. She said that many gave their lives, or were injured in the struggle for freedom and right against the forces of injustice and oppression. We recall the part they played and their sacrifice with gratitude and thanksgiving.

There were three hymns sung to the accompaniment of Malcolm Wood playing his electric organ, firstly "O God, our help in ages past", next was "Lord of our lives" and the final hymn was "God the Lord of hosts is with us evermore". There followed a two minute silence and the Reading which was from John 15.9-17.

After prayers were said The Last Post was sounded by trumpet, a silence and then a trumpet Reveille. ... And finally... the Act of Commitment and the Blessing.


