# Party plans are underway

Egerton will be joining the national celebrations of commemoration of the 75th Anniversary of VE Day with a village picnic and celebration ceremony to which you are all invited. The event will be held in and around the Millennium Hall on the Bank Holiday of Friday May 8th starting with a 1940's themed picnic from 1.30pm.

Everyone is invited to dress in 1940's garb and to bring along their own picnic and chairs and tables to kick off the day of celebrations. Marquees and the village hall will provide cover and there will be bunting and displays of memorabilia to help every-

one get into the spirit of the age.

The agenda will then follow the national events with a playing of the Last Post and Reveille, a Piper playing Battle's O'er and the VE Day 75 anthem followed by everyone joining in the toast to those who lived throughout the war at 3pm. At 7pm the

Church Bells will chime with churches throughout the nation in a ringing out for peace.


#### **Calling local businesses!**

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# What's happening with the shop and Post Office?

#### **EPC Chairman Richard King reports:**

The village shop and Post Office is now under offer. It is our understanding that the prospective buyers will not continue to operate it as a convenience store and Post Office.

At the time of writing contracts have yet to be exchanged, but it is likely that the shop will close in its present form sometime in the spring. This would also mean the closure of the current post office facility in Egerton, which is highly disappointing news.

A Public Meeting will be held on Friday 28<sup>th</sup> February at 8pm in the Millennium Hall to discuss the options now open to our community to replace the facilities we will be losing. The working group set up by the Parish Council to raise the cash to allow us to buy and operate the shop and post office (see

earlier editions of *Egerton Update*) formed a Community Benefit Society, Egerton Community Stores Ltd., to do this. It was estimated that over £500,000 would have to be found, but initial pledges were just under half that amount and last summer it was reluctantly accepted that the community would be unable to raise all the all money needed. The shop was once again placed on the open market.

A way is now being sought in which a 'pop-up' post office can be operated in the village for at least two days a week, and an alternative location would have to be found, at least on a temporary basis, from which it would operate. Further volunteers are also being asked to come forward to help the working group investigate alternative options to replacing the village shop.

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# Campaign to save Lenham Heath hots up

Save Our Heath Lands (SOHL) would like to thank everyone for the overwhelming support at Friday's (24th Jan) residents' meeting with Maidstone Borough Council and Helen

Whately MP. Over 300 people turned out to show a united front; residents from Lenham and surrounding villages, parish council representatives, borough councillors, landowners, and other interested parties. The message was loud and clear: "A Garden community does not belong on our doorstep", the action group said.

The group added that they were disappointed with Maidstone Borough Council and felt MBC's representatives at the event gave underwhelming and dismissive speeches and avoided answering questions put to them.

"There was some excellent points made throughout the meeting and hopefully Maidstone council will now re-evaluate their plans," SOHL said.

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### Arts Society: culture for all

The Art Society Egerton aims to inform, educate and entertain people with enquiring minds about all manner of topics around the arts. It does so principally through its programme of meetings where world class speakers give illustrated lectures about art, architecture, theatre, sculpture and literature. Special interest days, visits and tours are also arranged.

On 12 February Magdalen Evans a contributor to BBC Woman's Hour and works with charities that help ex-offenders through art and education will talk on Creativity in UK Prisons. On 11 March Julian Halsby a talented artist himself and the foremost expert on Scottish watercolours will lecture on *The Glasgow Boys: Painting in Scotland* 1875-1914.

On 8 April Jacob Moss from The Fan Museum, Greenwich will speak on *Painted Pleats – a History of European Fan Painting.* On 13 May Denise Heywood will lecture on *Stamford Raffles – Art Collector and Discoverer of Singapore*; she is an art historian, author, lecturer, photographer and journalist and has enthralled us before with her tales of Southeast Asia. #### **Phone Box Saved**

The last remaining public telephone box in Egerton has been saved from removal by BT. An application to remove the telephone box, which is situated opposite the Barrow House in The Street, was made by BT to Ashford Borough Council late last year.

However, following an objection to the proposal by Egerton Parish Council, which was supported by Ashford Borough Council, the plan to remove the box was shelved.

BT had claimed that the telephone box had been little used in recent times but in the submission by the Parish Council, it was stated that one of the reasons for its lack of use was due to the fact that the handset had been broken for a significant amount of time, rendering the telephone unusable. It was also pointed out that the electric light in the box had also failed and that problem had also not been fixed by BT for many months.

Following the decision, Parish Councillor Peter Rawlinson asked BT to fix the handset – which they did – and then gave the telephone box a thorough cleaning. He also asked for the light bulb to be replaced, which finally happened during January.

The telephone box can be used for emergency calls and for other calls by using a pre-paid calling card, such as the Post office phone card, and by using the 0800 access number.

Of particular worth to the record was (and is) hearing reminiscences of the old girls, one of whom was past WI member and president, Ruth Russell.

Anyone with educational connections reading this report might be interested to know that

schools in the area can visit one of the air-raid shelters as a boost to World War 2 studies, which are on both the primary and secondary curriculum. 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#### **Honour for Harold**



Harold Hilder, Egerton resident, has been appointed as an Honorary Alderman by Ashford Borough Council, in recognition of his many years service as a Borough Councillor. Harold is one of eleven Aldermen appointed at a ceremony at the Civic Centre presided over by the Mayor in October 2019, the first time such roles have been created. Alder-

men will support the Mayor in representing the Borough at public events. Harold, now aged 96, first got involved in local government as

a Smarden Parish Councillor when living at Homersham Farm in Bedlam Lane, Smarden, just over the border from Egerton. He then served on the West Ashford Rural District Council 1972-74, jointly representing Smarden with Arthur Palmer. He subsequently represented Smarden and Egerton on Ashford Borough Council 1977 to 1991, in the latter years serving as Deputy Leader and then Leader of the Council. This period saw some significant developments in and around the town. The M20 was extended from Maidstone to Ashford and beyond, recognising the need to improve the route to the Channel Tunnel which began construction in 1988. In the town centre, the Tufton Centre which had opened in 1975, was redeveloped to become County Square. Having moved the short distance to Egerton in 1986, Harold completed his service in local government as a member of Egerton Parish Council 1991 to 1995.

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
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# **Happy Feet**

Healthy feet are so important writes John Fletcher of Kent Community Health NHS Foundation Trust

Being able to walk without pain is generally taken for granted. But with age comes increasing



Toe nail disease often follows some initial damage to the nail which then becomes colonised by the organisms that cause the disease. It is very common (a figure of 14% of the population in the USA are reported to have it and 8% in the UK). Once growing in the nail the fungus is not easily eliminated. Topical treatments with chemicals designed to kill the pathogen can only do so if they can come into contact with it. And this is the problem. The fungus grows within the nail and treatments cannot totally penetrate the keratin of the nail. There are some treatments that are taken by mouth but these have important deleterious side effects for some people. They must also be taken for some months in order to allow a healthy nail to grow. The same fungus can also cause athletes foot. If you have one or other of these problems you can consult a podiatry specialist. There is a centre that specialises in treatments in Ashford. Appointments to see the appropriate person can be made via your doctor.

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

Our audiences, often numbering 60 or more people, enjoy a drink and a chat at the Millennium Hall before the film starts. Anyone can attend - admission is priced at £4 for members and £5 for nonmembers. On the last Thursday in February we present the big-screen version of "Downton Abbey", in which all of the original cast reprise their TV roles. On Thursday 26<sup>th</sup> March we're showing the stylish romantic comedy/thriller from the 1960s, "Charade", starring Cary Grant and Audrey Hepburn. In April we are having two film nights. The first, on Thursday 16<sup>th</sup>, is the critically acclaimed French film, "Les Gardiennes", set in rural France during the First World War, it tells the story of how the women of a farming community manage to cope while their menfolk are away at the front. At the end of April, we have veteran British film-maker Ken Loach's most recent offering, "Sorry We Missed You", a damning contemporary indictment of the gig economy and zero-hours contracts. This is followed in May by the American comedy-drama, "Green Book", the story of a working-class American bouncer (played by Viggo Mortensen) who is hired to drive a world-class black pianist (Mahershala Ali, who won an Oscar for his performance) on a concert tour from New York to the racially prejudiced Deep South in the 1950s.



# **Remembering Alan Palmer**

Alan Palmer was born on September 8th 1928 at Kingsden Farm, the third son of Les and Hilda Palmer. The farm had been rented by the family since 1890 and was purchased by them from the Cornwallis Estate in 1921.

Alan was educated at Egerton and Headcorn Primary Schools and had an idyllic childhood, learning to swim in ponds, playing lots of sport at school and sledging in the moonlight during the hard winter of 1940! On leaving school Alan joined his two brothers, Frank and Sid on the farm, attending farming classes in Ashford. In 1942 the RAF built two runways on the fields opposite Kingsden Farm and Alan's lifelong love of World War II aircraft and the flyers began. Many villagers will be familiar with his collection of airfield memorabilia collected over the years. Life on the farm was hard work, but there was still time for hobbies and interests. Alan had motorbikes and enjoyed watching motorsports and acted as a marshal for the Maidstone Car Club as they raced around the lanes at midnight. There were lots of dances and that's where Alan met Sheila in 1949, while she was doing her teacher training at Nonington College. From a farming family, Sheila married Alan in October 1954. They moved into their bungalow, Twixus, which was built for them and named because it was betwixt Kingsden Farm, where Alan was born, and Burnt House Farm, where his parents lived after Frank and Audrey took over Kingsden. Frank, Sid and Alan farmed together and shared the milking, each getting up at 3.45am every third week.

Alan ran the local tug of war team and did classes in woodwork. The skills he developed at a car maintenance course came in handy over the years, not just for cars but also tractors and lawn mowers. Alan loved reading and built up quite a library over the years lending his books to friends. He was generous with his time and would often leave what he was doing to help out a friend and neighbour with their mechanical problems and could usually find whatever was needed in his

1956 saw the arrival of son Ian, Andrew was born 2 years later and Graham arrived in 1962. Alan shared his love of the countryside with his boys, and there were holidays in the caravanette and on the Broads and trips to Farnborough and Biggin Hill Air shows.

Farming remained at the heart of family life and in 1976 Alan decided to set up

on his own. Ian and Andrew would help out haymaking after work/ college. Alan built a successful farm business raising livestock without the early starts of the dairy farmer. He bought a hedge cutter and over the years cut hedges from Staplehurst to Charing. Even after retiring from the farm the hedge cutting continued and his red tractor was a familiar sight along the lanes. Alan wrote a daily diary (although he did destroy the war-time ones - logging all the flights in and out of the airfield was probably not a good idea) right up until about 2 weeks before his stroke in 2019. Alan's memories of the airfield eventually were written down and became the start of what became his "memorabilia". His story was included in the BBC's "People's War" archive and he gave many talks on the subject, raising money for the Millennium Hall, the Over 60s Club as well as charities such as RAFFA. On the 50th anniversary of D Day, Alan and Sheila were invited for dinner aboard the QE2 in Southampton before it sailed for the Normandy commemorations the next day. The first flypast over the airfield memorial was in 1978 and 40 years later Alan flew overhead in a Spitfire, a  $90^{\text{th}}$  birthday present from the family. He was at the memorial in 2019, although not in the best of health having had a stroke in May. Sadly, the following week, he fell and broke his hip and he died in hospital on 19th November

### Climate change—how you can help

#### Lois Tilden writes:

Greta Thunberg, the 16-year-old Swedish girl championing the cause to combat climate change, gave an impassioned speech at the United Nations summit in September, criticizing world leaders for their "betrayal" of young people through a lack of action on the climate crisis. She is calling on Governments to do more and implores individuals to play a part too.

The UK Government confirms that there is clear evidence to show that climate change is happening. The UK is already affected by rising temperatures. The most recent decade has been on average 0.8 °C warmer than the 1961-1990 average. All ten of the warmest years in the UK have occurred since 1990 with nine occurring since 2002.

#### How can you do your bit to help save the planet?

- Plant a tree or several trees if your garden is big enough and choose its site carefully. Trees absorb carbon dioxide and give out oxygen. They create better shade than a parasol and provide natural air-conditioning!
- Drive cars less frequently; car share; when you next buy a car, choose one that is electric or a hybrid
- Reduce/ give up using aircraft holiday closer to home, use trains (Eurostar is on our doorstep))
- Eat food that is locally-grown, or grow your own if you can; reduce your meat intake
- Use energy-efficient lighting and switch off unnecessary lights and gadgets
- Consider energy-efficient systems or renewable energy to heat your home when you need a new system and insulate what you can to conserve energy
- Cut down on products that include palm oil too many palm oil plantations are causing deforestation of natural rainforests (check ingredients of shampoo, cleaning products, even crisps, ice cream and some supermarket bread). The rainforests are the Earth's lungs and many species will perish - including humans - if they are destroyed.
- Reduce, reuse, recycle as many things as you can take unwanted clothes, furniture or bric-a-brac to charity shops and buy from them too; or advertise for sale or wanted on the website "My Next Door" https://nextdoor.co.uk
- Think of another way of reducing your carbon footprint.



Over the last million years or so the Earth's climate has had a natural cycle of cold glacial and warm interglacial periods. This cycle is mainly driven by gradual changes in the Earth's orbit over thousands of vears but is ampli-

fied by changes in gases produced by human activity and other influences. Rising levels of carbon dioxide and some other gases create a 'greenhouse effect', trapping the Sun's energy and causing the Earth, and its oceans, to warm up. Carbon dioxide levels have increased by about 45% since before the industrial revolution. Other greenhouse gases have increased by similarly large amounts. About 43% of the carbon dioxide produced goes into the atmosphere, and the rest is absorbed by plants and the oceans. Deforestation reduces the number of trees absorbing carbon dioxide and releases the carbon contained in those trees back into the atmosphere. All the evidence shows that this increase in greenhouse gases is almost entirely due to human activity. The increase is mainly caused by: burning of fossil fuels for energy; agriculture and deforestation; and the manufacture of cement, chemicals and metals.

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#### **FAMOUS RESIDENTS IN ASHFORD**



The Ashford International Model Railway Excellence Centre, also known as AIM-REC, launched in December in a tempo-

rary unit under the Picture House Cinema. Six tracks were installed, including the layout which won Ashford modelling team "The Railmen of Kent" the Channel 5 Great Model Railway Challenge. The lease is for 12 months unless a permanent tenant arrives in the meantime. However, there are rumours that they could move permanently into part of the ex-Debenhams store. Discussions are taking place with the owners of County Square about taking over one of the floors in the huge department store.



Edward Austen Knight was the third brother of Jane Austen. He was adopted in 1783 by Thomas and Catherine Knight (formerly Catherine Knatchbull of Chilham) who were childless. He became their legal heir that same year. Edward married Elizabeth Bridges in 1791 and they lived at Goodnestone Park in Dover. They had 11 children. When Thomas Knight died in 1794 he left Godmersham Park and other properties to his wife who immediately passed it on to Edward. He was the High Sheriff of Kent in 1801. Godmersham Park was described in the late 1800s as "situ-ated in one of the most beautiful parts of Kent, namely in the valley of the Stour, lying between Ashford and Canterbury. Soon after you pass

Wye Railway Station you see Godmersham Church on your left and just beyond it comes into view the wall which shuts off the shrubberies and pleasure grounds of the great house from the road." Edward died in 1852 and was laid to rest at St. Lawrence the Martyr Church, Godmersham.

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#### Celebrating two decades of computer assistance

#### **Ruth Haggie reports**

It was October 1999 when Egerton Telecottage - now named Egerton Computer Centre-opened under the auspices of Egerton Parish Council in the newly built Egerton Village Hall. The original idea of the Telecottage was for a centre to offer local villagers lessons and help in using IT as well as acting as a possible base for a local rural business. Starting with 7 networked PCs in a tiny space attached to the Hall, the Telecottage was run by a small group of volunteers including Roger Harper as Chairman and



IT lead, Peggy Harper as Treasurer, as well as Carol and Derek Budd-who have since moved away from Egerton-Richard King and Ruth Haggie, who have been steadfast supporters throughout.

In those days the Centre was still using floppy discs for file storage and had dial up for email and the internet with 56bit capacity. We now have a fast cable link of 32megbytes.

Demand for lessons started to grow and in 2003 the Committee took advantage of the Government's On Line initiative by applying to expand the Centre. This was successful and, with additional support from the Countryside Commission, an extension was built to the Hall, equipped with 12 PCs and teaching aids. By then Alison Richey had joined the Committee acting as a tutor and later as Treasurer. Keith Burleton, Mark Kingsbury and John Lawton also contributed to the Committee during this time.

Malcolm Laws, who had joined the Committee in 1999, took over as Chairman and IT lead in 2006 and maintains the website for the village, including the Computer Centre. The website promotes local businesses and activities.

Over the next 10 years, there were more than 900 participants in courses. Classes were run during the day, as well as the evenings, in Basic IT, Internet and E Mail, Word Processing, Excel and Digital Photography-the latter taught by former Pluckley resident Jackie Grebby, who also helped with Family History. People attended not only from Egerton but from surrounding villages and even Ashford. The Centre has also been hired for the day by local groups for training sessions or meetings and it continues to be available for this.

Eventually the number of people needing classes started to decline and more emphasis has since been placed on providing technical help and advice to people during the Saturday drop-in sessions. These are still being held every Saturday between 10 am and 12 noon for people looking for help with using laptops and tablets or dealing with computer viruses. Advice and help are free although donations are much welcome to help meet the cost of running the Centre.

The Centre has been re-furnished with office furniture kindly donated by Peter Rawlinson which provides a more relaxed atmosphere. A few years ago, Richard King and Derek Budd established the now flourishing Egerton Film Society which has been managed as part of the Computer Centre. Its profits are helping to keep the Computer Centre open for local people.

There are now 10 volunteer members of the Committee who also help to run the drop-in sessions each week: Chairman is Malcolm Laws, Viv Foulds acts as Secretary and Dave Austin is Treasurer. Other members are: Ruth Haggie, Richard King, Sylvia Tillman and Carol Hulm - an IT Consultant from Grafty Green. Chris Hollands and Sarah Gilbert have joined the Committee since 2017 and Heather James is a Parish Council representative. As well as advertising in Egerton Update, the Computer Centre is now also using the Next Door social network to alert people about the drop in sessions. We look forward to welcoming more visitors to the Centre in 2020 - if not the next 20 years!



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# The Garden in February, March & April

Tips for the amateur gardener by Kathy Hooke

The end of February is still winter; often wet and cold with easterly winds. Getting into the garden can feel like a challenge but there are plenty of jobs to get finished. Bare rooted trees and hedges need to be planted and all late winter and early spring pruning needs to be



completed by mid-March.

March is the month when things start to happen in the garden; hawthorn hedg-

es start to get their fresh green leaves; daffodils begin to bloom and the days get longer. Through April the pace of change quickens with new growth, spring blossom and later bulbs starting to fill the garden with greenery and colour. Spring is a busy time for gardeners; planting, weeding and setting things up for the summer crescendo whilst making time to enjoy the early flourishes of the garden.

#### **SPRING BULBS**

Early spring heralds the joy of all things small; snowdrops, crocuses, primroses and violets. Try planting some up in pots to put by the back door to bring early colour where you can appreciate them easily.

Adding a few new ones each year or planting up the ones you had in pots makes the task easier.

To get bulbs to come back again every

vear make sure you give them 6 weeks after flowering before you cut the leaves off as



these will feed the bulb for next year's display. Feeding them with a general fertiliser once they have finished will also keep them in good condition from year to year. If you find the leaves a nuisance plant them in your borders where the later flowering plants will hide the leaves.

#### **PRUNING**

Between mid-February and mid-March you need to prune late flowering shrubs, climbers and most roses.

Those shrubs which flower later in the year can be cut back now eg buddleia, hardy fuschias and late flowering spireas. Do not touch spring flowering shrubs such as philadelphus or weigela as they

flower on the shoots formed last summer and vou will lose this year's flowers.


Clematis need to be pruned except those that flower before June as you will cut their buds off.



All roses except rambling roses should be pruned by mid-March which need to be pruned immediately after flowering. Remove all dead wood at the base. Remove thin, weak growth - if it is thinner than a pencil, take it out. Prune the remaining branches to an outward facing bud, making cuts at a 45-degree angle sloping away from the bud, allowing water to run off. Prune to the height you

want your rose to be; if your rose is at the back of the border, leave it a little higher, at the front, give it a trim and leave it a little lower.





#### MULCHING

If you didn't mulch in autumn, March is the perfect time before there is too much new growth to work around. It will act as a soil conditioner, weed suppressant and moisture retainer and improves heavy clay particularly well. A good thick layer is most effective. Organic matter such as garden compost or bark, or gravel all make good mulches.

#### **WEEDS**

As the soil begins to warm up weeds start to grow in earnest. Hoed off regularly, annual weeds can be kept under control and can be composted as long as they aren't in flower or have seed heads on them. Perennial weeds such as nettles and docks need to be dug up to stop them coming back. Their leaves and stems can go on the compost but not their roots which may survive and spread round the garden.



When the weeds start to get going it is a sign that the soil is warming and a good time to sow hardy annuals. Try sowing a meadow mix this year. Clear an area of soil of perennial weeds and in mid-April, sow a packet selected from the many meadow mixes now available in garden centres. If you are lucky you will be presented with months of ever-changing flowers, all for the price of a packet of seeds.

#### PLANT SUP-**PORTS**

Many herbaceous plants will get growing by mid-April and it is better to get the supports in place before there is too much top growth to damage.



#### FLOWER BORDERS

Buy new perennials as they appear in the garden centres. Beware though because



garden centres like to sell what is looking good it is easy to end up with a garden full of spring and early summer plants in our enthusiasm to fill borders. It is often better to shop regularly

through the summer and early autumn to get plants that have a longer flowering season or order on line where there is a wider choice.

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
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# Your Parish Council Reports

This section has been written to give you a flavour of the meetings and find out some of the projects being undertaken by Egerton Parish Council. The full minutes are available on the Parish Council Website

#### November Minutes

Footpaths: There is 1 closed issue, 9 outstanding and 3 new footpaths issues.

Highways: There are 3 closed issues, 3 outstanding and 2 new highways issues.

New Grit Bins: Two new grit bins have been put in place - at the junction of Egerton House Road/Coldbridge Lane, and the junction of Rock Hill Road/Crockenhill Road. Older people's accommodation: Meetings have been arranged with the working group and solicitors on the Heads of Terms Once finalised Councillors will get a copy.

Extension - Games Barn: The Committee need to be kept informed of progress. VE Day Celebration 75 Years: A working group has been formed to have a village 'party' on Friday 8th May 2020.

Map on Glebe: A quote has been given to install new posts and erect the sign for the new footpaths map. It is hoped the old sign frame could be cleaned beforehand.

Rubbish bin: Tim and his grandson Haidan were thanked by the Parish Council for several maintenance jobs.

UKPN Power Partners: Grants may be available for renewable energy initiatives. A councillor will check if they are still available.

Trees in recreation ground and others to maybe be felled: Ken Mulholland supplied a company to give a free check of trees and a quote for any work that might need to be done. Ken and Graham will liaise.

Christmas Fair: The date of the fair will be Saturday 7<sup>th</sup> December to be held in the hall and outside area from 3.00 to 5.30 pm. It is hoped the weather will be kind.

Steps: The steps leading to the cricket pitch were sprayed with fungicide to remove moss etc. A quote was received to fit chicken wire to the steps to help with traction.

Neighbourhood Plan Update: There is to be a meeting on November 30th which will be the final open consultation on the draft plan.

Lenham Heath Garden Community Action Group: This group are to oppose the Garden Community proposal by Maidstone Borough Council to build 5,000 new houses in the Lenham/ Lenham Heath corridor. Councillors unanimously agreed to oppose the scheme and support the opposition group. A councillor will attend future meetings.

Older people's accommodation: Lois noted the Heads of Terms drawn up by solicitors need to be discussed at a later date.

EPC agreed to vote against the proposed planning for the new Garden Village. The action group has produced some Christmas cards which 3 councillors will deliver to all residences in the village.
